Junior Ukrainian Orthodox League Convention 2016 - Submitted by Orest Mahlay



The 69th Annual UOL Convention started off on Wednesday, July 27th in Coatesville, Pennsylvania. The Junior executive board met just prior to the inaugural proceedings to discuss the upcoming sessions as well as some changes regarding the Convention. This year was the time to make some adjustments in the Convention format. Our two main directions of change were having more focused committees, as well as breaking up the formal sessions with some activities to encourage fellowship amongst each other.

The Junior Sessions this year were more practical and focused on giving the Executive board new ideas and direction for the upcoming year. Our first committee focused on **Fundraising and Communication**. This committee discussed different possibilities for supporting our activities, such as production

of a new t-shirt, sweatshirts and blankets. This committee also talked about the importance of communication, especially in regard to social media. They emphasized the importance of the existing Facebook page, and encouraged new platforms, such as Snapchat or Instagram.

The other committee addressed **Membership Development and Culture**. One focus of this committee was reviewing the existing promotional pamphlet for the Junior UOL. The committee suggested the revising of this brochure to include both Ukrainian and English as well as making the content more direct and clear. Another suggestion from the committee was the use of the app Remind101 to relay information to chapter presidents more efficiently.

MJSF Scholarships Submitted by Michael J. Komichak

The Metropolitan John Scholarship Fund (MJSF) was established by the Ukrainian Orthodox League of the USA (UOL) in honor of Metropolitan John Theodorovich, the first Metropolitan of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA (UOC of USA). The first MJSF scholarship was awarded in 1966. The purpose of the MJSF scholarships is to provide scholarships and



loans to seminarians preparing to enter the priesthood in the UOC of USA, and grants to Clergy of the UOC of USA for continuing education.



Following the recommendation of the NEB Vocations and Clergy Support Commission, and with the approval of the UOL National Executive Board, scholarships totaling \$5,500 were presented at the 69th Annual UOL Convention Grand Banquet to Deacon Michael Abrahamson, Subdeacon Volodymyr Yavorksyi, Yurii Bobko, Mykhaylo Bokalo, Vladyslav Huk, Vasyl Hrytskiv, Hryhorii Matviiv, Ihor Protsak, Tadey Surak, and Mykola Zomchak. We pray for their continued success in their studies.

We thank all those who have donated to MJSF, making it possible to give scholarships to these worthy recipients.



MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR UOL PRESIDENT

As you read this, October is upon us. Elsewhere in this Bulletin's issue you will have the opportunity to read about certain initiatives. In addition, our SOBOR is taking place within a few weeks and I hope you choose to attend, for at least the Friday session, for the reasons cited in my previous article. Herein, I would like to focus on a fundamental question(s) that some of us struggle with and expand upon certain of our other initiatives.

I have heard the question(s) posed as to why have a UOL Chapter or what does the UOL do? The more formal answer is to promote our Faith, to support our Church, and to develop our youth. That being said, in a less efficient manner here are my thoughts on this matter. I believe the real answer is more intangible, like All Saints Camp, where our children have the opportunity to meet their peers from across the country of like Faith and to make friends and family, or where families get to one know one another through encampments like Family Fest or Mommy/Daddy and Me. I believe, as others do, that the most important part of it is the "connectivity and the fostering of a larger community" that the League helps create within your Chapter and to other Chapters across the country-an extended family if you will, to help each other and to act as one united family. Frankly, we have few Church organizations that offer this opportunity to extend our family, to be there for one another, and to work on things together as one. Now what we do or do not do with that opportunity and where we prioritize it as a family, seems to be where we get lost at times. That can easily lead to frustration or lack of fulfillment.

Over the last seven decades this League has accomplished much. All Saints Camp, our outreach programs, and various scholarships are easy examples of what we can accomplish when we work together and get engaged. In addition, how we conduct business has even served as a template to other Church organizations. There are many examples. Nonetheless, we struggle. As was discussed at this past convention, our lives have stages associated with it. Those stages have different challenges associated with them. This is where an effective Senior UOL can play a greater leadership role and help ensure the needs of our entire Church family are focused upon, in addition to developing its youth. We are here to promote and demonstrate our Faith.

With struggle, at times help is needed, change required, priorities re-evaluated and new objectives developed. As a friend said to me, no one is stopping the League from accomplishing anything we want if we choose to be engaged-therein lies the rub. We need new ideas, time and if we engage together we can change the tide. Over the last several years we have lost chapters, and we want you back-tell us how to help! We will certainly be reaching out to you.

Other areas of focus this year, not discussed elsewhere in this Bulletin, will be:

Our Youth

Whether it be the membership of the Junior UOL, All Saints Camp Teenage (TC) participation, or the lack of Young Adults at the Senior level, all signs point to issues we have to work on. Simply said, we can do much better. There will a heavy emphasis this year on Young Adults and our Juniors and their needs. Monica, Taylor, the Junior Board and the Young Adults Committee members will, I hope, guide us in the right direction.

Education and Lenten Retreats

With the success of recent Lenten retreats and feedback from the recent convention, we are going to push to expand the geographic areas covered with new retreats. We need people at a local level to take on this challenge, and although we will be searching you out, nothing stops you from reaching out. What stops us having retreats on the West Coast or in the Chicago area? Nothing. We will be here to help. We have also heard you loud and clear about continuing to work on future conventions, and to de-emphasize the business end while emphasizing the needs of those attending.

In addition, we are going to do all we can to encourage a Teaching Divine Liturgy at times throughout the year, where our Clergy explain at various points what is happening—to enable us all to understand and proactively experience the Liturgy. In many ways our Seniors need this as much as our Juniors. At a local level ask for it - it is available to you.

A final point. Our membership drive is normally at the beginning of the year. Are we actually doing it? Ask new members to join now, as you will read in Natalie's article. It may help someone in their life if they feel they are a greater part of the Parish family. While one of our main goals is to develop our Youth for the future, it does not mean we ignore the needs of all. We are a family in Christ and are here to help each other regardless of what stage we are in.

So.....Where/What exactly is Rhode Island?

In addition to knowing it is your host state for the 2017 Convention, you may also have heard people ask: “what island”, or “Is that part of Long Island?”

Nope, not an island at all—but we have plenty of them in our tiny state which is just 37 miles wide and 48 miles long. We are one of the six New England states, and we boast more than 30 islands to be exact!!

Rhode Island was the thirteenth (last) of the original colonies (“Fifty, Nifty United States, From Thirteen Original Colonies”). And now that I have the song stuck in your head, here’s a very brief history of how we came to be. In 1636, Roger Williams settled at the tip of Narragansett Bay, having been banished from Massachusetts Bay Colony for his religious views. He took up residence on land that was granted to him by the Narragansett Indian Tribe. He called his site “Providence Plantations” and declared it a place of religious freedom. This was how the tiniest state in the union got the longest name: “The State of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations,” a name that we still go by today.

Another change the Juniors implemented during this convention was the revamping of the agenda to create an environment of fellowship and bonding. One major reason for this change was based on the idea that the Junior UOL must become more inclusive, having youth from the age of 10 (instead of the traditional 13-18). This change included the formation of teams for Convention



activities. Chapter Challenge continued as a junior activity but expanded to include more rounds for the purpose of raising excitement and participation. Some other activities we included were Icebreakers (getting-to-know-you games), Ukrainian / UOL scavenger hunt, and Bible charades, as well as

some activities we did in the evenings. These activities helped the Juniors become one family, as well as increasing productivity during the actual sessions.

**St. Thomas Weekend in South Bound Brook

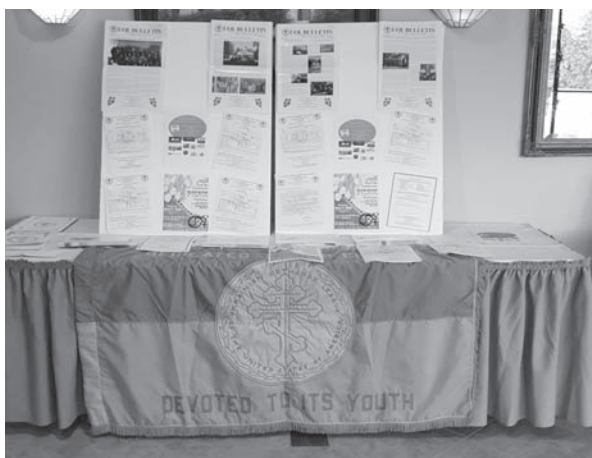


The UOL once again played an important role in making the Annual St. Thomas Pilgrimage at the Metropolia Center in South Bound Brook, NJ a success. Alexander Shevchuk and Mickey Komichak organized the weekend parking staff, which consisted of 18 volunteers from four UOL Chapters: Holy Ascension Maplewood, St. Sophia Seminary, St. Demetrius Carteret, and St. Andrew Silver Spring. The UOL parking staff processed over 900 cars. The UOL collected \$4,544 in parking fees for the benefit of the Consistory. The commemorative ribbon sales generated an additional \$1,867 for the UOL, which had been previously designated by the NEB to benefit the Metropolitan John Scholarship Fund (MJSF).



The St. Sophia UOL chapter sponsored a picnic at the Seminary on Saturday afternoon of St. Thomas weekend. The Shevchuk and Pishko / Komichak families (Maplewood), and Linck family (Carteret) brought several side dishes and a dessert to the picnic to supplement the hamburgers, hot dogs, etc. that the Seminarians prepared. The picnic raised a total of \$502 in donations for the Seminary: \$400 in checks written directly to St. Sophia, plus \$102 in cash. After the picnic, parking volunteers attached safety pins to more commemorative ribbons in preparation for sale the following day. With so many hands working, the task was completed very quickly!

The UOL had a display table in the Cultural Center with information about the League and the upcoming Convention. Following the Divine Liturgy on Sunday, Maddie Zetick and Alexis Naumenko of St. Vladimir Junior Chapter in Philadelphia carried the UOL banner at an outdoor memorial service served on the steps of the St. Andrew Memorial Church and during the procession to the nearby Ukrainian-American Veterans National Monument.

The sessions addressed some important topics for the Junior UOL. The Junior delegates discussed Great Lent Giveaway, which is an annual collection for different charitable outreaches during the Lenten weeks. The recipient of this year's efforts was Saint Jude Children's Research Hospital, a hospital that treats childhood cancer and other life-threatening diseases. The Junior UOL pledged \$1,500 to this effort and different chapters raised funds to reach this goal. The Executive Board expressed gratitude to all those participating. Another important element that was discussed during the sessions was the fact that the Executive

Board strived to limit their expenses and implement cost cutting in operation. This goal was accomplished as the board decreased certain spending and found alternatives that are more frugal.

Highlighting both the Senior and Junior Conventions this year was Bill Marianes' inspirational presentation. He touched upon various ideas regarding our faith in the present day. One topic that resonated with the Juniors was the idea that we must brand ourselves as Orthodox, especially considering the influence we have on the world around us as "walking billboards." Another



message that was passed on to us was the importance of our being enthusiastic for our faith as well as being firm in what we believe in, even as society pressures us otherwise. This discussion energized the Seniors as well as the Juniors and gave us many concepts to think about.

During the concluding sessions of the Convention, the Junior UOL elected new officers to serve during the 2016-2017 year. The new executive board includes:

The newly elected National Executive Board of the Ukrainian Orthodox League of the USA held their first full meeting of the year on Saturday, August 20, hosted by the St. Sophia Seminary Chapter of the UOL. Holy Hierarchs Chapel served by His Eminence Metropolitan Antony and His Grace Bishop Daniel. During the day-long meeting that followed, the NEB was treated to two delicious homemade meals (breakfast and lunch) prepared by the hands of the St. Sophia Seminarians themselves!

Overall, the meeting was very productive. The National Executive Board is very enthusiastic about meeting the challenges in the upcoming year and eager to take a step forward to make our church better for the future. “Praying Our Way Together” Series Continues Submitted by Janice Meschisen

The Education Commission of the UOL has been sponsoring the “Praying Our Way Together” Series for over a year now. Participants have prayed psalms, hymns, prayers, hours, liturgical offerings and readings, during the four Lenten periods of the church. Many parishes have been represented, including those from other dioceses, as individuals prayed in the comfort of their own home, mostly on their own time, yet felt connected to their brothers and sisters in Christ throughout the diocese in a very special way.

The Psalter Program has been the most popular. This program is prayed during Great Lent. The entire Psalter is read in its entirety, every day, as participants are divided into teams. Over the course of 20 days, individuals themselves, also end up praying all the psalms of the Psalter.

The series continued and expanded this summer for both the Apostles’ Fast and Dormition Lent. In the summertime, when most minds turn to vacation, beaches, and barbecues, people throughout the diocese made sacrifices by attempting to adhere to St. Paul’s decree to “pray unceasingly.” (1 Thess 5:17) Participants prayed and read offerings pertinent to the summer fasting and Holy Day periods.

For the Apostles’ Fast, 27 individuals took up the great challenge to pray the prayer of St. John Chrysostom for 24 hours a day for 11 days. 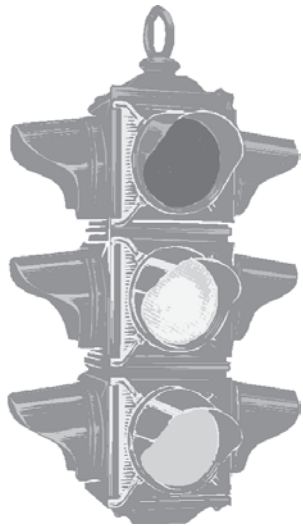

**The GO Challenge

At the UOL Convention, Bill Marianes was a guest speaker. As part of his presentation, he focused on our becoming Heroes and Disciples, by practicing courage, compassion and love. In his presentation he used two visuals to motivate the faithful. One was that of the Cross, and our need to be focused on moving closer and closer to Christ. The second graphic was that of a traffic light. As part of his presentation he encouraged everyone to identify items that they want to increase (go), moderate (slow) and stop (whoa). Following his presentation, there were two breakout groups where the delegates were encouraged to provide some information about strategies to change behavior.



If you have not seen the presentation, please watch the presentation as it is available. In the break out groups, there was discussion about how individual members can grow, using this “go, slow, whoa” metaphor. But there was also discussion related to our chapters as well as the national UOL in terms of behaviors to increase and decrease.

In terms of increasing behaviors, Mr. Marianes used an example of an Olympic distance running champion who was able to win the gold medal by only focusing on the next feet in front of him. Similarly we, while focused on our mission and the Cross, need to move forward one step at a time.

Following the traffic light image and our focus on the Cross, I would like to challenge all of our membership to be heroes and disciples. We often speak about the need to increase membership. This process is a step by step, person by person challenge. While we have the vision of the gold medal, we often forget the process of reaching out person to person.

So here is the “GO challenge!” Identify five people in your parish or other parishes who are not currently active members. They might have been members of the UOL before but are not currently members. They might be young adults who are attending college. For this next year, reach out to them. Not once, but every time there is a chapter or parish event, reach out. When you think of them, say a prayer.

Minimally, reach out to these 5 individuals once a month. Encourage them to come to your local chapter activities and UOL retreats. Encourage them to come to All Saints Camp. Encourage them to come to the Convention. If one of your individuals is a young adult in college, offer to bring them to church. If you would like to make a formal commitment to this challenge, please email me. I promise to send email reminders or notes as reminders. If you wish to remain anonymous but complete the challenge, please do so. Each month in the Bulletin I will add a “GO” tip to encourage individuals who take the challenge.

If you accept this challenge, here is your first assignment: identify your 5 people. Write their names down. Keep this list in a place you often see, by the mirror, by your computer, or in your wallet. The next assignment will be in our next issue.

We are called at this very moment to be disciples. The light is green! Let’s GO!
