Junior UOL Convention - All Saints Camp - Emlenton, PA

The 72nd Annual UOL Convention began on Thursday, August 1, at All Saints Camp in Emlenton, PA. The Junior Executive Board held a meeting prior to the beginning of sessions to discuss what would occur over the next few days of convention. This Junior Convention we decided to continue modifying the sessions in order to drive a more focused aspect of committees as well as to encourage fellowship among the delegates. Chapter Challenge continued as an annual Junior activity. We also held a few icebreaker games (team building games) in order to make everyone feel comfortable. These activities helped the Juniors grow closer together, as well as break up the business sessions.

The National Executive Board reported on the activities held in the previous year, such as: Great Lent Giveaway, which is an annual fundraiser that benefits various charitable organizations. This fundraiser is held annually during the Great Lent. The organization that benefited in 2019 was Heifer International, a charitable organization that works to end hunger and poverty around the world by providing livestock and training to struggling communities.

Another important project that the Junior UOL National Executive Board worked on and will continue to work on is reaching out to parishes in order to promote the Junior UOL and to encourage activities on the local level. Furthermore, the Junior sessions this year became more focused on giving the Executive Board new ideas for the upcoming year.

Our first committee focused on Local Chapter Programming. This committee discussed different ideas and activities that chapters could build upon during

the course of the year. The committee made a list of activities and fundraisers that chapters can implement during the year, no matter what size the chapter is.

Our second committee addressed Christian Caregiving. This committee was responsible for developing ideas for the National Junior UOL Board regarding Great Lent Giveaway. Being that this is the Jr. UOL's biggest project, the National Executive Board felt it was important to obtain feedback from the delegates of the convention when selecting a charitable organization for the upcoming Great Lent Giveaway. This committee recommended the following focus areas: refugee assistance program through International Orthodox Christian Charities and aid for college mission trips. Both of the committees presented their reports to the entire Convention body.

During the closing sessions of the Convention, the Junior UOL elected new officers to serve during the 2019-2020 year. The new Jr. UOL National Board is comprised of the following individuals:

Junior UOL Chapter Achievement Award 2019

St. Vladimir, Philadelphia, PA

The 2018-2019 Junior UOL Chapter Achievement Award was awarded to St. Vladimir, Philadelphia, PA. This chapter has continuously participated and assisted in many parish activities during the past year and has become a key aspect of the parish life.

The Philadelphia Junior chapter has twenty four (24) members and all juniors participate in church school. Ten members participate in the choir and twelve are altar servers. The chapter sponsors convention registration and for 2018 sponsored nine delegates to the UOL Convention.

The chapter made significant donations including \$200 each to Souper Bowl Sunday and Great Lent Giveaway (Heifer International). In addition to these donations they donated food items to Philabundance, a local food bank, and prepared paschal baskets for shut-ins.

They plan and sponsor several Junior UOL events in the parish including a cookie walk, pancake breakfasts and Salad Fest. Additionally they assist with all parish events including assisting with parish dinners, and working at the Christmas Bazaar.

The Junior UOL members work closely with the younger children in the parish. They include them in social events and also sponsor activities specifically for the younger children including a Fall Festival (where children play games and dress in costume) and an egg hunt in the spring.

The juniors participate in regional activities. Six juniors attended the UOL Retreat, four assisted with St. Thomas Sunday parking and three attended Christmas at the Seminary.

The chapter has sponsored a Lock-in for the last few years and this year all 24 members attended the Lock-in.

Spiritual Advisor, Fr. Taras Naumenko, wrote "St Vladimir Junior UOL Chapter remains active with a focus on caregiving and fellowship. The older Junior UOL members are now focusing on transitioning and introducing the 10 to 12 year old children to the chapter and including them in various activities as to ensure continuity in years to come. I am very proud of our parish youth who have truly become close friends, support one another and the younger youth of our parish as well as support all parish events."

It's November and I'm sure Chapter life is up to full speed! I'd therefore like to make **Chapter Life** the focus of this month's President's message.

I know we all get very busy at our parishes. The same group of people tends to be active in everything. Yet I'm hoping all still have time to focus on the mission of our Ukrainian Orthodox League of the USA – "Dedicated to our Church, Devoted to Its Youth." At my home chapter (St. Vladimir Cathedral, Philadelphia), we have three focus areas: Major Projects, Chapter Events, and Support of Parish Events.

Major projects planned include raising funds to contribute to All Saints Camp Capital Campaign – planning for the next 50 years, and our Mission Project continues the pilot for the UOL Christian Caregiving and Missions Commission to help new immigrants.

Our Calendar of Events for the year includes cultural activities, such as the Hayivka after Pascha and Pysanky lessons. To enrich our prayer life, we are participating in the "Praying our way...." events sponsored at the national level and continuing our "Morning Prayers" teleconference Monday – Friday at 7:15AM. We are hosting parish events such as the Thanksgiving Dinner, Malanka, Holodna Kutya (Theophany Eve Dinner), and Theophany Brunch. We have other social activities planned to unite us as one family in Christ including, bowling, Family Fun Night, and a trip to see Christmas decorations in the city.

We support our parish by running the two largest fundraisers – the Basket Raffle and Christmas Bazaar, along with the annual Indoor Yard Sale. We raise funds for LSSK via a bake sale and support MJFS through a collection at a parish dinner.

Yes, the Philadelphia Chapter is large, but I will tell you all -- although we rely on the support of many of our members on the day of the event, the planning for the events mentioned is actually done by a fairly small group. You can do some of these things, too, even with a small chapter and it can serve to help your chapter grow and help others grow in the Faith.

I would be remiss if I didn't mention the person behind all of these wonderful ideas, Dr. Natalie Bilynsky, our Chapter President (and also the UOL Bulletin Editor, so I hope she doesn't edit this out!). The bracelet, a variation of the Orthodox Prayer Rope, is made with seeds commonly called "Mary's tears." The beads are said to come from a plant that sprouted at the Cross during the crucifixion of our Lord Jesus Christ. The plant sprang from the tears of the Mother of God. A story is told that a monk struggled making a prayer rope and the Theotokos appeared to him as he was crying in desperation that he could not master the prayer rope. She placed these seeds into his hand so that he could create a prayer bracelet. The seeds of this plant naturally have an area that can be tied together.

The bracelet is beautifully packaged in an organza purse with a brief description of this story and how to use a prayer bracelet. All bracelets are made for adults (approximately 8 inches – with a slight variation based on the size of the seeds). Please specify if you request a larger or a smaller bracelet. 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Prayer

The Education Commission of the UOL will be featuring articles that focus on prayer. Saint Theophan the Recluse - Homily 2

Mental Prayer

Previously I showed you... how to pray in a way which corresponds to the meaning of the prayers. But this is only the beginning of the art (science) of prayer and it is necessary to go further. Consider the study of language, for example. First one studies words and phrases from books. But this is not sufficient, one must go further, and truly reach the point where he can correctly form phrases in the given language without the aid of the text-book. It is the same in the work of prayer.

First Follow Prayer Rule with Prayer Books

We get used to praying with prayer books, praying using prepared prayers given to us by the Lord and the Holy Fathers who were successful in prayer. But we should not stop at that, we need to continue on, and having accustomed ourselves to making petition to God for help with our minds and hearts, we must attempt to ascend to Him.

We must strive to reach the point where our soul by itself begins speaking, so to speak, in a prayerful conversation with God and by itself, ascends to Him and opens itself to Him and confesses what is in it and what it desires.

The soul must be taught how to ascend to God and open itself to Him. I will briefly instruct you how one should proceed in order to succeed in this art.

The skill of praying with piety, attention, and feeling according to a prayer book itself leads to this higher level. In the same way that water flows out of a bowl that is overfilled, so the soul which is filled with holy feelings by prayer begins by itself to spill out its prayer to God. But when pursuing this goal, there are particular steps which each person on this path must take.

Why is it, you ask, that one can pray for so many years with a prayer book, and still not have prayer in his heart? I think the reason is that people only spend a little time lifting themselves up to God when they complete their prayer rule, and in other times, they do not remember God. For example, they finish their morning prayers, and think that their relation to God is fulfilled by them; then the whole day passes in work, and such a person does not attend to God. Then in the evening, the thought returns to him that he must quickly stand at prayer and complete his evening rule.

Next Steps

In this case, it happens that even if the Lord grants a person spiritual feelings at the time of the morning prayer, the bustle and business of the day drowns them out. As a result, it happens that one does not often feel like praying, and cannot get control of himself even to soften his heart a little bit. In such an atmosphere, prayer develops and ripens poorly. This problem (is it not ubiquitous?) needs to be corrected, that is, one must ensure that the soul does not only make petition to God when standing in prayer, but during the whole day, as much as possible, one must unceasingly ascend to Him and remain with Him.

First Step: Cry Out to God More Often

In order to begin this task, one must first, during the course of the day, cry out to God more often, even if only with a few words, according to need and the work of the day.

Beginning anything, for example, say "Bless, O Lord!" When you finish something, say, "Glory to Thee, O Lord", and not only with your lips, but with feeling in your heart.

If passions arise, say, "Save me, O Lord, I am perishing." If the darkness of disturbing thoughts comes up, cry out: "Lead my soul out of prison."

If dishonest deeds present themselves and sin leads you to them, pray, "Set me, O Lord, in the way," or "do not give up my feet to stumbling."

If sin takes hold of you and leads you to despair, cry out with the voice of the publican, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." Do this in every circumstance, or simply say often, "Lord, have mercy," "Most Holy Theotokos save us," "Holy Angel, my guardian, protect me," or other such words.

Say such prayers as often as possible, always making the effort for them come from your heart, as if squeezed out of it. When we do this, we will frequently ascend to God in our hearts, making frequent petitions and prayers. Such increased frequency will bring about the habit of mental conversation with God.

Second Step: Ascribe Everything to the Glory of God

But in order for the soul to begin crying out in this way, one must first teach the soul to ascribe everything to the glory of God, all of its works, whether great and small. This is the second way of teaching the soul to turn to God more often during the day, for if we apply ourselves to fulfill the apostolic commandment, that is, do all things for the glory of God, even "if we eat or drink" (1 Cor 10:31), then we will ceaselessly remember God in all that we do. Our remembrance of God will be accomplished not

Lynn Sawchuk-Sharon Kuzbyt Memorial Scholarship Award

The untimely deaths of two lovely, dynamic and vibrant young women in late 1974 and early 1975 left an indelible mark in the life of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church, the Ukrainian Orthodox League and in the personal lives of their many friends. Therefore, a memorial scholarship in honor and memory of Lynn and Sharon was established at the 28th Annual Convention to perpetuate their memory. The scholarship is awarded to an applicant or applicants who are members of the Junior Orthodox League or within five years of academic performance in high school who is/are considered outstanding in several areas. Among those are: academic performance in high school, involvement in extracurricular activities and service to the League. This year's recipients are Anna Swindle, Delia Walkowicz and Christopher Pokotylo.

Anna Swindle is the daughter of Fr. Mark and Pani Stephanie Swindle of Pittsburgh, PA. Anna has shown outstanding academic performance in school having been on the honor role all her high school years. In addition, she completed 252 hours of community service, was a member of the French Club, Art Club and the Math Club where she held high offices, and was a member of the student Senate of her school.

Anna serves her parish by singing in the choir, being a church reader, being involved in church school, helping with maintenance of the church grounds, folding church bulletins, helping with mission fund raisers and being a part of the Sisterhood. She has participated in charitable fundraisers at local churches. Anna has also been active in the Orthodox League joining as a member-at-large since her home parish doesn't have a chapter. Her service to the League included being the Treasurer on the Junior National Board. Anna's commitment to her parish and God's works make her a deserving winner of the LSSK scholarship.

The next winner of the LSSK scholarship is Delia Walkowicz of Sts. Peter and Paul Ukrainian Orthodox Church in Youngstown, Ohio. Delia is the daughter of Mike and Crystal Walkowicz. Delia had excellent academic performance at school. She was very active in Drama, and was a member of the National Honor Society, Italian Club and the traveling volleyball team. Delia is an outstanding musician. She plays the cello and was in the Boardman High School Orchestra, Chamber Orchestra, and Project Mayhem, a musical group at the school. As a senior, Delia won the senior solo competition earning her a concerto performance with the Boardman Orchestra. In addition to her school activities, she was a member of the Youngstown Youth Symphony Orchestra and the librarian and manager for the Dana School of Music Orchestra. Delia's string quintet frequently plays for events at the church.

Delia has been very active in church activities. She has been a member of the Junior UOL for several years and held the office of Treasurer for one year, Vice-President for two years and President for two years. She has been dedicated to keeping the Juniors active. Delia sings in the church choir and

simply, but with care, so that in no case we would act wrongly and offend God by any deed.

This will help us to turn to God with fear, prayerfully asking for help and understanding. Since we are almost always doing something, we will always be turning to God in prayer. Consequently, the art of raising up the heart in unceasing prayer to God will develop within our souls.

In order for the soul to do all things as they should be done, that is to the glory of God, one must prepare from the early morning, from the very beginning of the day, before "a man goes forth unto his work, and unto his labors until evening" (Psalm 103(104):23).

Third Step: Contemplation of God

This inclination leads to the contemplation of God, and this the third way of teaching the soul to turn frequently to God. Contemplation of God is the pious reflection on divine properties and actions, and about our necessary response to them. It means to reflect on God's goodness, righteous judgment, wisdom, omnipotence, omnipresence, knowledge of all things, about creation and industry, about the working of Salvation in our Lord Jesus Christ, about grace and the word of God, about the holy mysteries and about the Kingdom of Heaven. If you start to reflect on any one of these things, your soul will immediately be filled with pious feeling toward God.

Consider, for example, the goodness of God, and you will see that you are surrounded by God's mercies, both physical and spiritual, and that you would have to be a stone not to fall down before God pouring out feelings of thanksgiving.

Consider the omnipresence of God, and you will understand that you are always before God, and God is before you, and thus you cannot avoid being filled with pious fear.

Consider the knowledge God has of all things, and you will realize, that nothing inside of you is hidden from the eye of God, and will set yourself to be strictly attentive to the movements of your heart and mind, in order not to offend the all-seeing God in any way.

Consider the righteousness of God, and you will believe that not one evil deed remains unpunished. As a result you will firmly set yourself to cleansing all of your sins in a heartfelt way before God with brokenness and repentance.

Thus, whatever property or action of God on which you reflect, that reflection will fill your soul with pious feelings and inclinations towards God. It will align all of your human substance towards God, and it is therefore the most direct means of teaching the soul to ascend to God.

The most useful and comfortable time for this is morning, when the soul is not yet burdened with many worries and work issues. Specifically, the best time is after morning prayers. Finish your prayers, sit down, and with thoughts cleansed by prayer, begin to think now about one divine aspect, and tomorrow about another, and incline your soul to this aspect. "Come", says St. Dimitri of Rostov, "come, holy contemplation of God, and let us immerse ourselves in contemplation of the great works of God," and he passed mentally through the works of providence and creation, or the miracles of our Lord and Savior, or His sufferings, or something else, and warmed up his heart, and began to pour out his soul in prayer. Everyone can do the same. The work is small; one only needs desire and resolve, but the fruits are many.

Summary

Three means to teach the soul to ascend prayerfully to God other than the prayer rule:

1. Dedicate some time in the morning to the contemplation of God;
2. Turn every action to the glory of God, and
3. Often turn to God with short prayers.

When contemplation of God goes well in the morning, it leaves a deep inclination toward thinking about God.

Thinking about God makes the soul carefully order all of its actions, interior and exterior, and turn them to the glory of God. At the same time, this sets up a state in the soul that it often will be moved by prayerful cries to God.

These three: contemplation of God, doing all to the glory of God, and frequent short prayers are the most active weapons of mental prayer and prayer of the heart. Each of them raises the soul to God. He who decides to practice these quickly attains the habit of ascending to God in his heart. The labor put into these leads to the heights. The higher one ascends on a mountain, the freer and easier he breathes. Thus it is also here: the more one does these exercises, the higher his soul ascends, and the higher the soul ascends, the more freely prayer can act in it.

Our soul by nature is the abode of the higher divine world. Our soul should always be in this world by thoughts and feelings of the heart. But the baggage of worldly thoughts and passions leads and pulls the soul down.

These methods separate the soul little by little from the earth, and then completely pull it away. When they have completely pulled the soul from the earth, then the soul lives in its own region, and will happily live on high.

Here in heart and mind, and later in actual substance it will be vouchsafed to be before the face of God in the choirs of the angels and the saints.

May God grant this to all of you through his grace. Amen.

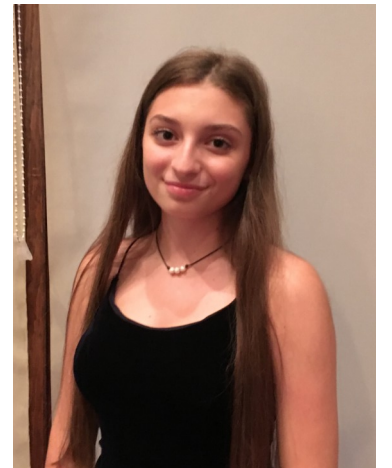
